# ODETTE'S VISIT CREATES REAL HOPE FOR RWANDA

A widow of the Rwandan genocide, Odette Kayirere, has spoken of the love and warmth she experienced during a recent visit to England.

"This has given me great hope," she said. "I did not expect to find such good friends in the UK who cared so much about my country."

Odette was in the UK to attend a fundraising lunch in Milford Hall hotel, Salisbury, organised by Tisbury management consultant Jim Farrand association with Pennyfarthings Estate Agents. The event exceeded all expectations and realised over £19,000. The money will be used to support the activities of Odette's widows' and association, orphans' AVEGA Est, which is the main beneficiary of funding from Msaada

Odette spent several weeks during the 1994 genocide hiding from the Hutu militias who were butchering Tutsis in a vicious ethnic cleansing campaign that left an estimated 1,000,000 people dead in 100 days.

She and her six

daughters, aged at the time between two months and eight years, were saved from a brutal death when the Rwandan Patriotic Front invaded Rwanda from Uganda and halted the horrific genocide.

Odette's husband, a head school teacher, was murdered by the Hutu militia a few days into the genocide while trying to protect his village.

Odette's older daughters are still suffering from trauma as a result of their experiences during the terror.

When Odette came out of hiding she found eight orphans, who had lost their families in the genocide, wandering in the forest and she adopted them. She is currently caring for all 14.

Odette commented: "My visit helped people in England to learn more about the 1994 genocide calamities in Rwanda and to find out exactly how we work in collaboration with Msaada to reconstruct my country. It was also a golden opportunity for AVEGA to tell its story. My sincere thanks go to Msaada, who gave me this opportunity."

During her visit, Odette visited schools in the area which have raised funds

for Msaada including, Shaftesbury, Corfe Hills and Gillingham.

She met with Msaada supporters in the Two Brewer's Pub in Shaftesbury and spoke at a family service in St James Church in Shaftesbury at the invitation of Rev Anne Hayward.

Odette also visited North Dorset Rugby Football Club and saw her first rugby game. NDRFC members are heavily involved in supporting Msaada and through the club over £20,000 has been raised for the development agency.

"Odette impressed everyone she met while in the UK," Msaada chairman Chris Brickell commented. "Her dignity and humility as she recalled her experiences during the genocide moved many to tears."

## Hampshire to Cornwall walk by ex-chairmen

THREE ex-chairman of the North Dorset Rugby Football Club, who walked the border of Dorset to raise funds for Msaada last year, have just completed their second fundraising walk.

Martyn Jose, Nigel Pothecary and Bob Jones, did a 200-mile trek from Hampshire to Cornwall.

This year they have chosen to support the Dorset and Somerset Air Ambulance and Msaada.

The trek, which covers the Jubilee Trail, the East Devon Way and the Dartmoor Trail, began on May 12 and ended on May 25.

Last year's 208-mile walk took the three men 16 days.

"At the end of last year's walk I told people that I was looking at getting a hip replacement," Martyn recalled, adding "and I advised them to watch this space! Well, I have my

# Fergal urges caution in support for Africa

MSAADA's president, Fergal Keane has warned against the dangers of supporting kleptocratic political regimes when giving aid to Africa.

Fergal had just returned from a visit to the Democratic Republic of Congo where he was investigating corruption and lawlessness.

Fergal urged people to support smaller development agencies, such as Msaada, who were channeling funds directly to the people in local villages in Rwanda.

"We in the West often support criminal regimes in the belief that we can somehow control them. But the people in these regimes are cleverer than we give them credit for and they invariably take the aid our governments give them and bury it in Swiss bank accounts," Fergal commented.

He said it was far more effective to support smaller development agencies like Msaada, who can guarantee that their support is going directly to community groups in the villages and towns in Africa.

Fergal noted that not everyone in the UK

was concerned about the problems of Africa, but he said this was shortsighted.

"The problems that are becoming evident

in London due to immigration are a direct result of people fleeing from countries run by corrupt governments.


"The problem might seem very far away, but if we continue to ignore what is happening in Africa then these problems will inevitably land on all of our doorsteps."
